Imagine three siblings who were Catholic, walking to school everyday passing a cemetery. A Jewish cemetery. They never met any Jews in Przasnysz. Ed Janes was researching his Jewish family from Przasnysz. This is the story of how they met and joined forces. We were honored to hear Ed Janes and Maggie Goralczyk tell us about "Restoring Dignity: Planning and Executing a Cemetery Restoration Project in Poland". Their project took place in the town of Przasnysz. What occurred between Ed and Maggie and her sisters is quite an unbelievable and amazing story.

How they met and what happened between them is astonishing. Contact me if you didn't get the link to their lecture. Of course, Linda's comprehensive summary will be in the next issue of Chronicles. The Facebook group, **Friends of Jews from Przasnysz Poland** is administered by sisters, Maggi and Agata Goralczyk.

Agata, shared several links with me about **Dariusz Popiela**, a Polish Olympian, who has taken on the project of commemorating the Jewish community of Krościenko nad Dunajcem. The Popiela Family Foundation called "Centrum" was created by Darius. His Project, "People, not numbers" was made possible by Dr Karolina Panz's discovery of lists of inhabitants of the region of Podhale, prepared by Judenrate in 1942.

On <u>November 19, 2020</u>, Brama Talks guest will be Lubliner, <u>Leora Tec. Leora will present her latest project—undertaken with Brama Grodzka-Teatr NN—an online video archive called: The Neshoma Project: Conversations with Poles Rescuing Jewish Memory (website</u>

here <a href="https://neshomaproject.org/">https://neshomaproject.org/</a>). Over the last two years, Leora has interviewed non-Jews all over Poland who in different ways are remembering the Jews who used to be their neighbors. In our next Brama Talks she will introduce you to some of these people, for example, Dr. Krzysztof Czubaszek, who remembers the Jews of Lukow. Dr. Czubaszek told Leora, "I realized that there was something missing in this local history. I noticed that there is a blank space—there is no literature, no sources, publications where I could get any information about the local Jewish community. And it was this moment —that was the impulse. I decided that I want to investigate this subject."

Those she interviewed work in many different fields including scholarship, teaching, guiding, grassroots activities, museum work and the arts.

In conversation with Dvora Trachtenberg, Leora will share her experiences from working on The Neshoma Project and will introduce us to some of the people she calls "Rescuers of Memory".

Leora Tec is the founder and director of Bridge to Poland. She is the American Ambassador and Special Projects Partner to Brama Grodzka-Teatr NN. Her current joint project with Brama Grodzka is a video archive: The Neshoma Project: Conversations with Poles Rescuing Jewish memory. Leora traces her family in Lublin back to the 1700s. Her mother, Nechama Tec is a Holocaust survivor and Holocaust scholar who was born in Lublin in 1931.

Dr. Dvora Trachtenberg is a retired psychologist and a descendant of Lubliners. As part of a multi-faceted professional career, she has worked with those directly affected by the legacy of the Holocaust. These have included children of survivors, children of rescuers, and children of perpetrators of the Shoah. Dvora's parents were born in Lublin, Poland, and survived WWII by fleeing to the Soviet Union. She was born in post-war Poland and emigrated with her family while still a child.

Speaker: Jarrett Ross, aka GeneaVlogger, a youtube channel dedicated to Genealogy and Family

Research.

Topic: The Soil from Which They Grew: A History of The Alliance Colony



Jarrett Ross is the Lead Forensic Genealogist at DNA Labs International. He began seriously researching his family history in 2009 while finishing his undergraduate degree, quickly building an extensive family tree and connecting with thousands of relatives all across the World. Jarrett has since worked on hundreds of family trees, finding a specialty with Dutch Jewish ancestry, Jewish Agricultural Societies of Southern New Jersey, and Genetic Genealogy. Jarrett is also a volunteer curator on Geni.com, has served as the Vice President of the Triangle Jewish Genealogical Society since 2018, and is a board member of the Alliance Colony Foundation.

The Alliance Colony was the first successful Jewish agricultural colony in America, founded in Vineland, New Jersey in 1882. The community was originally settled by 43 families who were part of the Am Olam society which pushed to create Jewish agricultural societies in America. Alliance flourished

with more families settling in the Colony over the decades, growing into more colonies and creating an amazing legacy through its many descendants. Many Alliance descendants are still in touch after many generations and even have reunions with over 600 descendants attending. This presentation will discuss the History of Alliance and how collaboration between descendants has been a genealogical goldmine.

Speaker: Chuck Weinstein, 2019 JewishGen Volunteer of the Year

Topic: Choosing a Genealogy Software – A Comparison

Chuck is a Past President of the Jewish Genealogy Society of Long Island and co-chair of the 2016 Conference in Seattle. A family historian for over 25 years, he has spoken on a variety of topics in past Conferences. He has done extensive research on the Shoah and is writing a book on a town in Moravia that was devastated by the war.

There are several major software companies, and each has slightly different strong points. This lecture will focus on MyHeritage/Family Tree Builder and Ancestry/Family Tree Maker as well as options for Macintosh. We will examine the advantages of each and together build a small family tree, find relevant documents/images, attach these to the tree and build reports and charts.

**Topic:** Extra! Extra! Read All About it: Using Newspapers.com to Research Family History



Sharon Taylor graduated from Cornell University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Industrial and Labor Relations. For ten years, Taylor worked for the University of Colorado School of Medicine as a Professional Research Assistant.

Taylor and her husband live outside of Philadelphia where Taylor continues writing and researching her family and the Jews of Galicia. She is a member of Gesher Galicia, and the Jewish Genealogical and Archival Society of Greater Philadelphia. Her articles have been published in their journals, on The National Library of Israel Blog, and in Jewish newspapers in Philadelphia and Arizona.

Sharon Taylor's roots lay in Mariampol, a typical small town in eastern Galicia (today western Ukraine), and in Philadelphia. No vital records are known to exist for the time Taylor's family lived in Mariampol. In Philadelphia, it was rumored that Taylor's family was involved in organized crime, an activity that strives to leave no trace. Turning to <a href="Mewspapers.com">Newspapers.com</a> Taylor explored the tale of her great-uncle's kidnapping by the Russian Army. She'll share her results and methodology as she tracks the struggles of Mariampol during the First World War, and finds evidence of her family's colorful life in Philadelphia in the 1930's.

Ron has presented at 14 of the past 18 IAJGS conferences on a wide variety of subjects and has also been behind the scenes at 4 IAJGS conferences to help produce "Game Show Night/Jewish Genealogy Jeopardy". Ron has traced his roots to Lithuania, Poland, Romania, England, Belarus, and the Ukraine. In 2006 Ron appeared on the PBS TV series The Jewish Americans. He has published three books including The Jews of Sing Sing, and most recently, Mind Maps for Genealogy. Ron earned a B.S. in Engineering from Princeton and an MBA from the Univ. of Chicago.

You **never** know where you can pick up a hint or clue to better researching techniques. Don't forget our JGASGP Facebook group, Tracing the Tribe, Genealogy Portal, JewishGen, MyHeritage, Ancestry.com, Genealogygems.podcasts and Youtube (The Barefoot Genealogist, for example) for tutorials under many topics.

I wanted to remind everyone about the importance of signing up for **JewishGen Family Finder** and looking up to see if there is a Yizkor book for your family shtetl. If you are a new user, you need to create a free account on JewishGen.org. <u>Yizkor books</u> is under RESEARCH across the top. You can find <u>Family Finder</u> under DATABASES. If you are a <u>First Timer</u>, there are many tutorials under GETTING STARTED.

THANKS to Harry Boonin, who reminds us about the web site **Chronicling America**. It is an online, word searchable American newspaper website for hundreds of newspapers from each state in the United States <u>up to and including 1922</u>. I thought it might be updated so I wrote to the Library of Congress, the entity responsible for the web site. Their answer is found below.

Thank you for contacting the Library of Congress. We do have some newspapers on Chronicling America that were published after 1922 but none of those are from Pennsylvania. For many years we did not include material published after 1922 because some content might still be under copyright. Determining if something was still under copyright protect takes time and resources that we did not want to spend at the time.

Over time the situation has changed. We now have a solid collection of pre-1922 material. We are more willing to devote more effort into finding more recent material. I cannot say when we be adding more Pennsylvania titles. We were working with Penn State on the titles from there and they never recommend anything post 1922. We need to either reestablish our relationship with them or find another local institution to work with before we proceed.


