From the President's Desk

From the President's Desk- A return to the story of Miša Grünwald

Last month, I shared information about what researchers may find online about the Nazi concentration and slave labor camps. This information was from the USHMM website. The US Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington DC has one of the world's most extensive repositories of artifacts, photos, letters, artwork, journals, and historical documentation of those caught up in this horrific event.

I have been part of the USHMM Museum Teacher Fellowship (MTF). Through this program, we were taught by world renowned scholars to become highly qualified Holocaust educators. What I learned from the MTF and the USHMM itself, will always be important to me, and I am grateful for the training which prepared me to teach the Holocaust. April 1945 was the month of liberation of most of the slave labor and concentration camps; Auschwitz was liberated earlier by the Soviets in January of that year. Since then, April is the month of Yom HaShoah and most Holocaust remembrance activities around the world. In keeping with the importance of this month in Jewish history, I would like to provide our members with an update on a special Holocaust survivor some of you will remember: Miša Grünwald, aka Frank.

Two teachers from a high school in Fleetwood, PA had met Miša and heard his testimony. This experience changed their lives and their students' lives as well. They returned to their school after meeting him and decided to work on a project to share Frank's remarkable story of surviving Auschwitz as a young boy. With the support of their school district, their goal was to produce a documentary film with their students being actively engaged in the entire film-making process. JGASGP heard about this in the development stage because both of the teachers were also part of the MTF program and friends of mine. They presented a very convincing "pitch" and our society became sponsors of "Miša's Fugue" and we are actually in the credits at the end.

In 2012, the film premiered at a theatre in Reading and we eventually hosted a screening for our members. There was not a dry eye in the house then, and if you watch this film on Amazon now, you will find Frank's story deeply touching. After the film was released, it won many awards and even received Mid-Atlantic Emmy nominations. The students who wrote the script, designed the graphics, played the score, interviewed Frank, etc. were transformed by this experience. It was a brilliant way to engage young people in learning about the Holocaust. I am so happy our society had a small hand in this project coming to fruition.

Today, Frank is doing well. He is now 88 and has stayed clear of the Covid-19. His mother's letter, seen below and with her two sons, was featured poignantly in the film, and is now part of the Permanent Exhibition at the USHMM.

Speaker Ken Bravo: "You've done your DNA, now what?" Who are these cousins you keep hearing about? And how are they related to you?

Many of us have sent our DNA for analysis, curious about what we might find. We receive an ethnicity estimate and a long list of matches ranging from 2nd cousins to more distant ones. Sometimes we are contacted by people on the list of matches who are trying to decipher the relationship. Who are these people? And how do we make sense of their relationship to us?

Ken Bravo will help you create a strategy for reviewing and prioritizing that list. Bravo's presentation will cover his process, developed over many years, of working with genealogy and DNA matches. He demonstrates how he separates relatives due to endogamy from "real" relatives. He works with family trees and looks for linkages in the matches, often looking for common surnames. He will explain how people who have tested with multiple DNA providers can get different ethnicity results. Using examples from his own large Lithuanian family, he will demonstrate how he has identified

new branches of his family tree through DNA analysis. He will also explain the Gedmatch tool and share examples to illustrate how he has used it to further his family research.

Ken Bravo is President of the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies (IAJGS) and Past President of the JGS Cleveland. and is a frequent lecturer on a variety of genealogy subjects. He has been searching his own roots since the mid-1970s and, in more recent years, has added the families of the spouses of his four children to his research. He is a member of the Association of Professional Genealogists and has his own business, The Nuts & Bolts of Jewish Genealogy, to assist others in researching their family histories.

Finding Presidents' (and Your) Ancestors in the Strangest Places

You might think that U.S. presidents are a breed apart from your ancestors, but they are not. They also arrived on ships and came face-to-face with the census taker. This talk will show you how to search for presidential records, and, in the process, it will teach you how to search for your ancestors' records. There are similar problems with both searches, including misspell-

ings and incorrect dates, and we'll learn how these problems can be tackled.

Getting Ready for the 1950 Census: Searching with and without a Name Index

In April 2022, the 1950 census will be released! It will not have a name index, so finding people in the census will involve searching by location instead, meaning finding and using the Enumeration Districts (EDs) of the census, so the location needs to be converted to an ED before the census can be accessed. The One-Step website contains numerous tools for obtaining EDs. This talk will present the various tools and show how to use each one. Download handout

Steve Morse, creator of the "One-Step" web pages, has been a mainstay of genealogy research, inventing many tools that ease research work for both the novice and the experienced genealogist. He managed to get EllisIsland.org to use his approach to ease research on that site and has developed special tools that help handle data as each new U.S. census has been released.
