Our guest speaker on Sunday was Marian Smith, Retired Historian at INS. Over 80 members signed in to learn about naturalization records!

Marian presented an overview of how to approach researching USCIS Records. US immigration and naturalization records were illustrated using documents of Jewish immigrants. She developed a timeline tool (included in the handout) and demonstrated how plotting an immigrant's life events can identify what records may exist for that particular immigrant and where these records can be found.

There is **NO** one set of instructions. You must know what is appropriate to look for. She was inspiring as well as interesting! If you don't know about A-files and C-files, then you'll want to watch her presentation.

Here is the speech that Felicia gave at the celebration:

As president of the Jewish Genealogical and Archival Society of Greater Philadelphia, I would like to extend a warm local welcome to emcees Ambassador Aharoni and Gil Hoffman, the team of organizers for today's event, distinguished speakers and guests, and especially to the representatives of Lt. Col. Yoni Netanyahu's family.

The Jewish Community in Philadelphia is as old as our nation, with an amazing history. Our genealogy society, the JGASGP, is one of the largest and most respected organizations of Jewish family researchers in the US. Founded in 1979, we were formed before genealogy research could even be done on computers, let alone the internet!!

Since we do go back more than four decades, Yoni's connection to Philadelphia is still remembered by some of our members, including our society's webmaster, who attended Cheltenham HS with him.

Guest Speaker: Dr. Robert Watson, Historian, Author, Political Commentator, and Professor at Lynn University



Robert Watson is an award-winning author who has published over 40 books and 200 scholarly articles and essays on topics in history and politics, as well as two multi-edition, multi-volume encyclopedia sets on the presidents and first ladies. His recent books include Affairs of State (2012), America's First Crisis (2014), The Presidents' Wives (2014), The Nazi Titanic (2016), The Ghost Ship of Brooklyn (2017), George Washington's Final Battle (2021), Escape (2021), a story about a notorious Confederate Prison and the Union soldiers who escaped, and the forthcoming books When Washington Burned (2022) and 100 Days of Terror, a story about a pandemic that struck the capital city in 1793. His books have won the John Barry Book Award, John Lyman Book Award, Independent Publishers' Gold Medal in History, and others, have been published in international translation, and featured on C-SPAN's Book TV and at prominent literary festivals around the country.

Dr. Watson co-convened several national conferences, co-founded the annual Truman Legacy Symposium for the Truman Presidential Library, and served on the boards of numerous academic associations, community organizations, and the Harry S. Truman Foundation, Calvin Coolidge Foundation, and George McGovern Center for Leadership. Watson is the recipient of many awards for his contributions to the study of the presidency, election commentary, community service, civics programs, and efforts to combat anti-Semitism and incivility.

**Topic:** This talk takes you behind the scenes to the challenges, debates, and deals that resulted in the US supporting statehood for Israel in 1948. It is based on numerous interviews conducted over many years with former aides to President Truman and Israeli officials, and on extensive research in the archives of the Truman Presidential Library. What emerges is an inspirational story of enlightened leadership both by Truman and Chaim Weizmann and Abba Eban.

### from Joel Weintraub 1950 Census Update workshops on Youtube

I've been working the past few months upgrading our 1950 census tools for Philly on the Morse One-Step site. That culminated yesterday in my putting online a workshop for Philly researchers that I think you will be interested in.

Here's the details: On April 1st, 2022, the 1950 federal census will be released to the public. To support that effort for Philadelphia, the 3rd largest city in 1950, I have put on my **YouTube channel**, "**JDW Talks**", a two hour plus workshop in four parts on finding residents of Philly on the 1950 population schedule and finding information about block socioeconomic information on the 1950 Housing census schedule. The series is titled "**Yo Philly: 1950 Census Four Part Workshop"** and it is divided into:

Part A. Resources for your 1950 folder, information about Philly's 1950 census, name vs location searches for 1950 population schedules.

Part B. Addresses to EDs, using the One-Step Unified Tool, using, and understanding the 18 Philly 1950 Enumeration District maps.

Part C. Getting information about the 1950 Philly block your people lived on.

Part D. Addresses to tracts to EDs, 1952 Philly Report, problems with missing streets. I hope to shorten your learning curve on the use of locational search tools and prepare you for problems you could face.
