Family Relationship Chart

To find the relationship between two people, first determine the common ancestor you share and your relationship to the common ancestor: grandchild, great grandchild, etc. Pencil in the common ancestor's name, if it helps.

- Choose Person #1's relationship to that ancestor from the top row of boxes, e.g. "child."
- Choose Person #2's relationship to that ancestor from the left column of boxes, e.g. "grandchild."
- The box where the two intersect identifies the relationship between the two people in this case: Niece/Nephew.

From the President's Desk

In our last newsletter, I wrote about the importance of our society engaging in local networking, specifically with the Friends of Jewish Cemeteries, which is taking on the daunting task of updating local Jewish cemeteries that have fallen into disrepair and the Holocaust Awareness Museum and Education Center HAMEC. I am very pleased that Dr. Adam Denish, board member of HAMEC and a member of our society, has recently been appointed to our own JGASGP board as Liaison with HAMEC. Congratulations, Dr. Denish and welcome aboard! We have also stepped up our relationships with the local Kehillahs and the Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia, all of which further our networking and engagement in the local Jewish Community. I would like to expand on this topic after today's mesmerizing presentation by Rachael Cerrotti based on her podcast, website and book of the same name, We Share the Same Sky. As the granddaughter of Hana Dubova, the subject of her massive project. Rachael has become a role model for her own generation and clearly understands her legacy in continuing the testimony and survival story of Hana. As Rachael explained, there is an obvious interconnectedness between Jewish genealogy and the Holocaust. Her impact on both topics will be significant, and I know she is someone about whom we will hear more in the future! I have recently been in communication with a new organization with connections to both Jewish genealogy and Holocaust education. I would like to introduce you to <u>3GPhilly</u>, <u>3GNJ</u> and <u>3GNY</u> which also has a training program called **WEDU**. 3G's are much newer to the scene than HAMEC, which was founded 60 years ago, but these are also locally based. Members of the 3G groups are the grandchildren of Holocaust survivors who, like Rachael Cerrotti, are dedicated to sharing the histories of their grandparents with young people. Speaking to students about the life altering experiences of their own family members who were directly impacted by the Holocaust is not a simple task, and effectively teaching such a delicate topic to young minds requires care and skill. Speaker training is therefore organized by experienced WEDU volunteers who have spoken in classrooms. They are privileged to have one of my mentors, Peter Nelson, former executive director of the New York **Facing History and Ourselves** office, lead the sessions.

If your family includes adult grandchildren of Holocaust survivors, please let them know about the 3G chapters! In fact, trainings will be offered here in Philadelphia by 3GNY/WEDU this spring: May 24th, May 31st, June 7 and June 21st. For more information, see https://www.3gny.org/speaker-training

The JewishGen Family Finder: A Success Story

I am a huge fan of the JewishGen Family Finder (JGFF). Here is my latest experience.

Almost everyone who approaches me with questions, or requests for research help, wants to know the answers to one or both of these two questions:

Where did my ancestors come from?

What was their name in the old country?

Everyone who does this genealogical work knows which resources are most likely to be successful. But sometimes it happens that you can't find the answer, or can't be sure that what you found IS the right answer. This happened to me recently with a family I was researching. There were several documents where different names of the town were given—passenger manifest, naturalization papers, and WWI records (my top three favorites), but I was unable to decide which was the correct town for my people. I was pretty sure it was in Lithuania, and I wrote to Russ Maurer of LitvakSIG to get his best opinion of the correct town. He promptly replied, suggesting that the town was Sveksna, Lithuania. It sounded right, so I went to the JGFF and searched for people with the surname I needed and that town. I sent messages to possible connections.

Sure enough, I received a reply from a fellow researcher saying that his great-grandmother was from that town and had the same surname. It quicky turned out that his great-grandmother was the sister of the man I was looking for, and he had brought this sister and her children over to New York, by ones and twos over several years—information readily confirmed on their passenger manifests, with HIS name as their destination! Before this discovery, I had no knowledge of these family members.

So, thanks to the <u>JewishGen Family Finder</u>, and two wonderful volunteers, I learned what I needed and a lot more! I cannot stress enough to my fellow members of JewishGen not to overlook this incredibly useful resource.

Carol Clingan is a board member of the Jewish Genealogical Society of Greater Boston, where she is in charge of research projects. She lectures and teaches, as well as doing private research. Carol has been involved in genealogical research for more than 30 years and has traced her family in Ukraine and Belarus to the early 19th century.

We need someone who has the capability to make an interactive database on our website. Members will be able to input family names, where they are researching, and their e-mail if they want to be contacted by other members. The database needs to be sortable by name or town location. I have examples of the database used for the IAJGS conference in 2009.

Did you know that Ancestry has record collections that are available to browse but that cannot be searched because they are not yet indexed? While digitizing records is relatively fast and inexpensive, indexing those records is much costlier. Many online repositories have made these records available for browsing but working with them can be a challenge. This presentation will show you how to find and use these unindexed records to greatly enhance your research.

On assignment for a small-town newspaper in rural Pennsylvania, rookie reporter Jessica Weible meets Joan Swigart, a creative fireball and "pioneer in print." As the two women forge a relationship based on their passion for storytelling, Joan reveals a mystery that she had discovered years ago, but had never solved—a pile of dead letters found in an abandoned general store, just before it was torn down. Joan gives Jessica the letters, each stamped and dated over a hundred years ago, and encourages Jessica to investigate the untold stories of the people and places contained in each one.

What begins as yet another assignment for the reporter, a young millennial who relies happily on email and texting as the primary means of communication, develops into a heartfelt mission to tell the story of the people and places in the letters. The young reporter's journey takes unexpected twists and turns through the quiet lumber towns of Pennsylvania, the early American settlements in Massachusetts, the bustling crowds at Ellis Island, the violent strikes at the Passaic textile mills, and beyond.


