<u>Felicia and Dee</u> will be leading our discussion. You may have seen the tv version, but the book includes more information.




Book Club Meeting #6

Red Sea Spies: The True Story of Mossad's Fake Diving Resort by Raffi Berg, Peter Noble, et al.


Rebecca Parmet will be leading our discussion.

Catering for divers, it attracted guests from around the world. Little did the holidaymakers know that the staff were undercover spies, working for the Mossad - the Israeli secret service.

Providing a front for covert night-time activities, the holiday village allowed the agents to carry out an operation unlike any seen before. What began with one cryptic message pleading for help, turned into the secret evacuation of thousands of Ethiopian Jews who had been languishing in refugee camps, and the spiriting of them to Israel.

Written in collaboration with operatives involved in the mission, endorsed as the definitive account, and including an afterword from the then Mossad director, this is the complete, never-before-heard, gripping tale of a top-secret and often hazardous operation.

But she kept a secret more shocking than her heritage or her marriage: she was a scientist. And she had an idea that might help the country fight the Nazis and revolutionize modern communication...if anyone would listen to her.

Andrew Zalewski is past vice president of Gesher Galicia and a frequent speaker at meetings of Jewish genealogical societies and cultural and academic institutions in the US and abroad. His interest and writings



have focused on Jewish cultural transformation, educational access, modernizing impact of Jewish physicians, and Jewish political and legal rights in Galicia. Unique archival records—population surveys, maps, and old newspapers—provide the background for his in-depth description of Galicia.

He authored two books on Austrian Galicia: Galician Trails: The Forgotten Story of One Family and Galician Portraits: In Search of Jewish Roots, in which he traced the story of his ancestors in a historical context.

Andrew Zalewski is retired cardiologist and a former professor of medicine at Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia. After leaving academic practice, he held executive positions in pharmaceutical industry, focusing on global collaborations to advance new healthcare solutions

Topic: The Path to Modernity: The Jews of Galicia

Join us for a fast-paced journey through the centuries of Jewish experience on the path to modernity. The talk untangles confounding borders of Eastern Europe and the ways how Jewish lives continued to evolve there over centuries. The narrative takes us from a traditional communal autonomy to the Jewish Enlightenment (Haskalah); and then, from increasingly diverse Jewish cultural identities and politics to pressure to emigrate and through the crisis of the First World War. We explore these topics with a focus on Austrian Galicia, home of the largest Jewish community within the Austrian Empire.

The family-history researchers will find several threads connecting the talk with genealogy: surnames, marriage laws, languages, interethnic relations, and schools just to name a few. The presentation—based on a four-part course by Dr. Zalewski at Gratz College—is illustrated by short biographical profiles, unique archival records, and maps.







Jacky is an internationally acclaimed, award-winning documentary filmmaker, oral historian and media creator who has worked for over thirty-five years creating films and videos in the United States, Germany, Israel, and Bulgaria. He has worked on groundbreaking films in Holocaust Studies. He is the director, editor, producer, and distributor of three full-length documentaries and a dozen short videos about the Holocaust.

Martha is an award-winning author, oral historian, artist, and independent

scholar who has written several books about immigrants, migrants and the formerly homeless. In an effort to help dissipate prejudice and discrimination, she conducts oral histories to discover people's voices and stories to share within the social historical contexts with other people.

Topic: Book Talk - The Stolen Narrative of the Bulgarian Jews and the Holocaust



The speakers share a complex tapestry of voices and memories previously underrepresented, ignored and denied. It is an alternative perspective that includes stolen, silenced but now reclaimed Jewish narratives based on our peoples' experiences. It contextualizes and personalizes the history, reconstructs the puzzle, praises those who helped the Jews and shares their exemplary acts of humanity for future generations. It fills a void in the Bulgarian Holocaust literature—specifically first-hand accounts of memory of survivors, eyewitnesses, photographs, official publications, laws, and newspaper articles. 
project focusing on the Jewish community of Homestead, PA, available online at HomesteadHebrews.com. Tammy earned her AB in computer science from Harvard.

Topic: The Ancestor Deep-Dive: How You Can Find Out Everything There Possibly is to Know About Your Ancestor

Too often our research is driven by sources. We look for an ancestor in all the sources we've heard about, and we only break new ground when we hear about new ones. How do we assess how comprehensive our search has been? How do we know if we're even on the right path to get the answers we long for? This presentation will teach a methodology for creating a research plan centered on the discoveries we want to make, not just the sources we think we are limited to.

Introducing our newest feature:

"Harry's Corner"



I would like to help our members who have an interest in Russian pogroms. I have researched a lot of information concerning the Pogrom of October 1905. It is no coincidence that Russian Jews, mostly in Southern Russia (today, Ukraine) started to increase the immigration numbers after the Pogrom in Kishinev in 1903, and by 1906, and for several years afterwards, most of our ancestors who came to South Philadelphia came in those years.

My mother was born in Elizavetgrad in 1904. I researched

Elizavetgrad, where the immigrants crossed the Russian border (not much on that), my Zionist uncle who was killed by Cossacks, the role that charity played in immigration, the port of Rotterdam, a little about Ellis Island, and other matters. I have written a 19-page summary, divided into two categories: (1) page 1 - 17, my family's story, and (2) 48 endnotes on pages 18; 19 (the last item is a New Jersey newspaper, describing our 90th anniversary of our arrival in 1906). For your purposes, the 48 endnotes may be the most helpful. Some facts are of the one pogrom our family experienced and other facts may be useful for any pogrom (for one week in October 1905, there were over 600 pogroms, most lasting two or three days and most in Southern Russia).

If any members would like a copy of the 19 pages, just email harryboonin@gmail.com If questions arise, please get back to me (If you would like the Ellis Island account, make sure you ask for it separately; it is No. 48, endnote.) The document is not copyrighted. On the downside, a number of end notes will lead you to a foreign language, your largest challenge.

Dear JGS Presidents:

I would like to bring to your attention an interesting **new volunteer opportunity** for genealogical researchers that I encourage you to share with your members.

Thanks to a recommendation from former IAJGS President Ken Bravo, we learned recently about an organization called **Operation Benjamin**. The aim of **Operation Benjamin**, according to its website (www.operationbenjamin.org), is:

"...to locate Jewish personnel at American military cemeteries all over the world who, for various reasons, were buried under markers incorrectly representing their religion and heritage. Our mission is to correct these mistakes and provide, these many decades later, comfort to the families of the fallen. We work quietly and with dignity, without any cost to the families involved."

Operation Benjamin employs a senior genealogist but would very much welcome the research efforts of JGS volunteers. The volunteers would research the genealogy of WWII soldiers who are believed to be Jewish based on initial research, to confirm ancestry, and identify living descendants.

Any JGS member interested in volunteering as a researcher for **Operation Benjamin** should send a brief bio highlighting his/her genealogical experience to my Board colleague Mel Fishman (<u>Mel@iajgs.org</u>) by October 12th. Mel, who has agreed to serve as liaison between IAJGS and **Operation Benjamin**, will forward all expressions of interest to the organization's senior staff.

The program is looking for those with high level genealogical expertise but also has tasks appropriate for less experienced researchers who are passionate about the mission of the organization.

Do have a look at this article which appeared last spring in the NYTimes (click <u>HERE</u>), reporting on a public ceremony in which a WWII Jewish soldier's incorrect grave marker is replaced with a Star of David.

New Podcast with **Dr. Andrew Zalewski** Talking About his Years at Gesher Galicia

Dear Friends:

Andrew Zalewski is past vice president of Gesher Galicia and a frequent speaker at meetings of Jewish genealogical societies and cultural and academic institutions in the US and abroad. His interests and writings have focused on Jewish cultural transformation, educational access, modernizing impact of Jewish physicians, and Jewish political and legal rights in Galicia. Unique archival records—population surveys, maps, and old newspapers—provide the background for his in-depth description of Galicia.

He authored two books on Austrian Galicia: "Galician Trails: The Forgotten Story of One Family" and "Galician Portraits: In Search of Jewish Roots", in which he traced the story of his ancestors in a historical context. Andrew Zalewski is a retired cardiologist and a former professor of medicine at Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia. After leaving academic practice, he held executive positions in the pharmaceutical industry, focusing on global collaborations to advance new healthcare solutions.

About the speakers

Elaine Terranova is the author of *The Diamond Cutter's Daughter: A Poet's Memoir* (Ragged Sky Press, 2021), and 10 books of poetry. Her most recent poetry collection, *Perdido*, came out in 2018 from Grid Books and her next, *Rinse*, is forthcoming in 2023.

Her poems have appeared in *The New Yorker*, *The American Poetry Review*, *Ploughshares*, *Prairie Schooner*, *The Virginia Quarterly Review* and, including prose pieces, more recently in the magazines *Cincinnati Review*, *Boulevard*, *Hotel Amerika*, *South Loop Review*, *Storm Cellar*, *Mom Egg Review*, *Laurel Review*, *The Alaska Review*, and *Valley Voices*, where an interview with her appears in the spring 2022 issue.

Among her awards are a Pushcart Prize, a Pew Fellowship in the Arts, the Banister residency at Sweet Briar College, the Judah Magnus Award in 1992 for a Poem on the Jewish Experience: "The Stand-Up Shtetl," two Pennsylvania Council on the Arts fellowships, and a National Endowment in the Arts Fellowship in Literature.

She taught English and creative writing in the Philadelphia area for 30 years, at the Community College of Philadelphia where she was also a reading-writing specialist in the Learning Lab; at Temple University, where she held a Dean's Appointment; at the University of Delaware as Assistant Visiting Professor; at the Curtis Institute of Music as Assistant Professor in Humanities; and as Distinguished Visiting Lecturer in the Rutgers, Camden MFA Program.

Rebecca T. Alpert, professor emerita of religion at Temple University, was among the first women in America ordained as a rabbi, at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College in 1976. Her primary field of study is American Judaism in the twentieth century, focusing sports, race, and sexuality. Her best-known works include Like Bread on the Seder Plate: Jewish Lesbians and the Transformation of Tradition; Whose Torah? A Concise Guide to Progressive Judaism, Out of Left Field: Jews and Black Baseball, and with Jacob Staub, Exploring Judaism: A Reconstructionist Approach. She is a recipient of Temple's Great Teacher Award (2016), a member of the Rabbinic Council of Jewish Voice for Peace, and a Commissioner on the Philadelphia Commission on Human Relations.


