TIP: USE DIFFERENT RESOURCES. DON'T GIVE UP!

I had been searching for my Aunt Evelyn's burial date, location, and headstone. I had conflicting information about the location. I found an obituary on Newspapers.com. Newspapers.com only had the California death index. Find-a-Grave had nothing. I recently had a hint from Geneanet. I



wasn't going to look because it was my tree on that free site. I did look and saw that there was burial information for her and a picture of her headstone from Billion Graves.com!



Here is what I found.





Chronicles, the journal of the Jewish Archival and Genealogical Society of Greater Philadelphia is published quarterly in both electronic and print editions, typically running twenty-eight to thirty-six pages. The graphics editor works collaboratively with the editor of *Chronicles,* to design and layout the journal.

A modern computer and desktop -publishing software (which JGASGP will purchase and maintain) are needed to work on the publication. A large screen moni-

tor and color printer are a big help. Familiarity with desktop publishing software, such as Adobe InDesign, QuarkXpress or Microsoft Publisher will be necessary to produce *Chronicles*.

The current editors will assist a volunteer, to help them gain the skills necessary to create and edit *Chronicles*. JGASGP can fund professional training, if necessary, for a volunteer to learn the use of the software.

Robert Watson is an award-winning author who has published over 40 books and 200 scholarly articles and essays on topics in political, military, and social history, as well as two multi-edition, multi-volume encyclopedia sets on the presidents and first ladies. Some of his recent books include *Affairs of State* (2012), *America's First Crisis* (2014), *The Nazi Titanic* (2016), *The Ghost Ship of Brooklyn* (2017), *George Washington's Final Battle* (2021), and *Escape* (2021), as well as the forthcoming books *When Washington Burned* (2023) and *American's First Plague* (2023). Watson's books have won numerous awards including the Independent Publishers' Gold Medal in History and Silver Medal in History, John Barry Book Award, and John Lyman Book Award, have been featured on C-SPAN's Book TV and at prominent literary festivals around the country, and are available in both

audiobook and international translation.

Topic: The Legacy of the Nuremberg Trials

This presentation examines the philosophical, legal, and political debates surrounding the decision to hold the trials as well as the format for the trials, types of trials, and categories of charges and crimes. We will consider the important legacy of these historic trials on international law and human rights, but also their impact far beyond the courtroom.

FAMLY FINDER PROJECT UPDATE:



Many of you have shared your family surnames, towns, and countries that you are researching. We now have a spreadsheet with over 1300 responses. I realized that many towns had inconsistent spellings yet were the same town. Countries didn't always match the current, modern town name either. My grandfather, for example said he was from <u>Transylvania, Hungary</u> on the 1920 census. The modern town is <u>Poiana, Romania</u>. I know it makes sense for all of us to use the same source for our information.

It was time for me to go into action. For consistency, I researched the names of the towns and countries using JEWISHGEN.org. Using the TOWNFINDER (Communities Database) and/or the JEWISHGEN GAZETEER, I was able to make many changes to keep everyone "on the same page". I Googled the

names I couldn't find on JewishGen as a Jewish community. Some were located. Others were not. I am going to have Jim post the draft version for everyone to check.

So, when I do send out the finalized FF Project, you may not recognize "Your" towns as the way you originally sent them to me. I want you to research those names to double-check my work (I DO MAKE MIS-TAKES) and learn what the modern town is for your ancestor. JewishGen.org is free for all to research.

The towns I am unable to locate will be highlighted in red with (?) next to it. That means I was unable to find a listing for I anywhere. Please feel free to research on your own and correct any errors I've made.
