Read below how Beth Stein was inspired by Tammy Hepps at our last meeting: "I had an amazing find after yesterday's meeting with Tammy Hepp. I forgot to use such a simple thing as newspaper.com. One of my great-grandmothers was Bertha Markheim Wichner from Krakow, Poland. She and her husband Max arrived in NYC in 1899, and initially settled in Baltimore, where a few of her other siblings settled. I had a major brick wall for one of her sisters, my great aunt, Chana/Anna/Annie Markheim. She arrived with her mother (my GGGM-Pessel Huppert Markheim) at the port of Baltimore in 1900 and then disappeared. She was about 20 years old. But she didn't disappear! I searched in newspapers when I got home from Tammy's presentation and found a 1903 marriage announcement for an Annie Markheim. Bingo. One

problem, the groom's last name was cut off. But I now had his first name, Leon. So, I did a search in the 1910 federal census, for Baltimore, with an Annie and a Leon, and found the full last name, Schmayer. Then everything fell into place. I even found Leon Schmayer's naturalization papers, witnessed by Annie's brother-in-law, Samuel Koenigsberg, so additional validation I got it right, as another sister, Sadie was married to Samuel Koenigsberg, and they lived in Baltimore. Unfortunately, Annie died in 1916. I have a copy of her headstone. By 1920, her husband moved with their two kids, to LA. He never remarried. There

are lots of descendants of the two kids, several with Facebook Goldstein's Ground profiles. California centric. My brick wall is down". So, in short, our meetings are very helpful!

TIP: AI (ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE)

AND MY NEW FAMILY MEMBER!

Ancestry.com sent me a 'hint'.

My "cousin", **Mary Lois Mazer**, was listed in the 1950 census. What? I have a new cousin that I never heard of before? Her relationship to the head of the household was U2o(?) What does that mean? Household members: 4.

I knew that Louis, Renee, and Josette Mazer lived in the Bronx. Louis was VP of a costume jewelry manufacturing company. That was correct. I have photos of them. But Mary Lois was not on my tree! Who was she? What happened to her?


With careful inspection of the actual 1950 census document, I read under Josette's name: **No one home. See sheet 80 Line No 20.** There is **NO** Mary Lois Mazer! AI made up a cousin's name and counted her as part of the household!

Make sure you dig a little deeper and review the documents to check the facts before adding information to your family tree!



## **Graphics Editor, Chronicles**

Chronicles, the journal of the Jewish Archival and Genealogical Society of Greater Philadelphia is published quarterly in both electronic and print editions, typically running twenty-eight to thirty-six pages. The graphics editor works collaboratively with the editor of *Chronicles*, to design and layout the journal.

A modern computer and desktop -publishing software (which JGASGP will purchase and maintain) are needed to work on the publication. A large screen monitor and color printer are a big help. Familiarity with desktop publishing software,

such as Adobe InDesign, QuarkXpress or Microsoft Publisher will be necessary to produce *Chronicles*. The current editors will assist a volunteer, to help them gain the skills necessary to create and edit *Chronicles*. JGASGP can fund professional training, if necessary, for a volunteer to learn the use of the software.

Robert Watson is an award-winning author who has published over 40 books and 200 scholarly articles and essays on topics in political, military, and social history, as well as two multi-edition, multi-volume encyclopedia sets on the presidents and first ladies. Some of his recent books include Affairs of State (2012), America's First Crisis (2014), The Nazi Titanic (2016), The Ghost Ship of Brooklyn (2017), George Washington's Final Battle (2021), and Escape (2021), as well as the forthcoming books When Washington Burned (2023) and American's First Plague (2023). Watson's books have won numerous awards including the Independent Publishers' Gold Medal in History and Silver Medal in History, John Barry Book Award, and John Lyman Book Award, have been featured on C-SPAN's Book TV and at prominent literary festivals around the country, and are available in both audiobook and international translation.

#### **Topic: The Legacy of the Nuremberg Trials**

This presentation examines the philosophical, legal, and political debates surrounding the decision to hold the trials as well as the format for the trials, types of trials, and categories of charges and crimes. We will consider the important legacy of these historic trials on international law and human rights, but also their impact far beyond the courtroom.

#### FAMLY FINDER PROJECT UPDATE:

Check out our new **JGASGP Membership Family Finder!** It's on our website jgasgp.org. Look under the resource's menu pulldown for members only! You must be signed in.



Many of you have shared your family surnames, towns, and countries

that you are researching. We now have a spreadsheet with 1,359 responses. I realized that many towns had inconsistent spellings yet were the same town. Countries didn't always match the current, modern town name either. My grandfather, for example was from <u>Transylvania</u>, <u>Hungary</u> on the 1920 census. The modern town and country is <u>Poiana</u>, <u>Romania</u>. It makes sense for all of us to use the same source for our information when we are making comparisons.

For consistency, we researched the names of the towns and countries using JEWISHGEN.org. Using the TOWNFINDER (Jewish Communities Database) and/or the JEWISHGEN GAZETTEER, we were able to make many changes to keep everyone "on the same page". When towns couldn't be found on JewishGen they were Googled. Some were located. Others were not.

When you look at the JGASGP Membership Family Finder, you may not recognize "Your" towns. Please note the new location to aid in your personal research.

The town/s that were not located have (?) next to it. It doesn't necessarily mean it doesn't exist, but the spelling (phonetically, sounds like, fuzzy match, etc.) wasn't recognized in any search.

Let me know if you'd like to make a connection with another member. I will share the emails of the potential matches with each other.

I foresee updating this list yearly when members **rejoin.** New members will be asked to fill out the membership form and use the modern town and country of their ancestors as a requirement.

**Program:** Join us for a primer on how to find synagogue records, what genealogical material they include, see examples, and hear about JewishGen's new *Shul Records America*: the first-of-its-kind inventory of American synagogue records. Finding synagogue records can be problematic and time consuming as there are errors in catalogs and a variety of ways materials are described. To make it easier, and in one place, JewishGen starts the search for you with *Shul Records America*. This new finding aid points to the location of American synagogue records. Launched in fall 2022 with over 500 collections held at 50 repositories (including the Western Reserve Historical Society) or websites, about 20% include URLs for digitized materials. Not only a historical resource but important as modern-day synagogues merge or close, *Shul Records America* encourages congregations to preserve records with genealogical value.

**Speaker**: Ellen Kowitt is Director of JewishGen's USA Research Division and National Vice Chair of the Daughters of the American Revolution Jewish Specialty Research Team. She is past president of Jewish Genealogical Societies in Colorado and Greater Washington, DC, and she served for three years on the IAJGS board of directors. Ellen publishes articles in *Family Tree Magazine*, she has completed the ProGen Study Group, attends genealogy institute programs, and is a member of the Colorado Chapter Association of Professional Genealogists.
