



Thank you to all who attended the last Book Club meeting to discuss We Were the Lucky Ones: A Novel by Georgia Hunter. It is highly recommended if you are interested in historical fiction about the Holocaust. This story was about real people from the author's family.

Elisa said, "This book has been very important to me-both my parents are survivors from Radom, and I've learned a lot from Georgia's Hunter's powerful emotional writing and accurate history. My mother's house served



as part of the ghetto border in the larger, Walowa ghetto-- one side of the house faced the Aryan section, and the opposite side of the house opened out into the Jewish ghetto.

My mother and aunt worked in the same factory (AVL) that Jakob and Bella worked in.


My father's history paralleled to a large extent that of Genek and Herta. He crossed the Bug River to Lvov. He was arrested and wound up in a prison in Siberia. Freed in 1942, he spent the rest of the war in Uzbekistan".

1. The Weight of Ink Rachel Kadish

Wednesday, September 27, 2023, 7:30 pm



Set in the London of the 1660s and of the early 21st century, *The Weight of Ink* is the interwoven tale of two women of remarkable intellect: Ester Velasquez, an emigrant from Amsterdam who is permitted to scribe for a blind rabbi just before the plague hits the city, and Helen Watt, an ailing historian with a love of Jewish history.

As the novel opens, Helen has been summoned by a former student to view a cache of 17th-century Jewish documents newly discovered in his home during a renovation. Enlisting the help of Aaron Levy, an American graduate student as impatient

as he is charming, and in a race with another fast-moving team of historians, Helen embarks on one last project: to determine the identity of the documents' scribe, the elusive "Aleph".


Electrifying and ambitious, sweeping in scope and intimate in tone, *The Weight of Ink* is a sophisticated work of historical fiction about women separated by centuries, and the choices and sacrifices they must make in order reconcile the life of the heart and mind.

2. Tomorrow, Tomorrow, and Tomorrow by Gabrielle Zevin

Wednesday, October 25, 2023, 7:30 pm

This is a story of making and playing games, a story of friendship, a story of loss and love, and a story of forgiveness. On a bitter-cold day, in the December of his junior year at Harvard, Sam Masur exits a subway car and sees, amid the hordes of people waiting on the platform, Sadie Green. He calls her name. For a moment, she pretends she hasn't heard him, but then, she turns, and a game begins: a legendary collaboration that will launch them to stardom.

These friends, intimates since childhood, borrow money, beg favors, and, before even graduating college, they have created their first blockbuster, *Ichigo*. Overnight, the world is theirs.




Not even twenty-five years old, Sam and Sadie are brilliant, successful, and rich, but these qualities won't protect them from their own creative ambitions or the betrayals of their hearts.

3. The Spy Who Loved: The Secrets and Lives of Christine Granville by Clare Mulley

Wednesday, November 29, 2023, 7:30 pm (5th week of Nov.)

The Spy Who Loved presents the untold story of Britain's first female Special Agent of World War II. In June 1952, a woman was murdered by an obsessed colleague in a hotel in the South Kensington district of London. Her name was Christine Granville. That she died young was perhaps unsurprising, but that she had survived the Second World War was remarkable.



The daughter of a feckless Polish aristocratic and his wealthy Jewish wife, she would become one of Britain's most daring and highly decorated special agents. Having fled to Britain on the outbreak of war, she was recruited by the intelligence services and took on mission after mission. She skied over the hazardous High Tatras into Poland, served in Egypt and North Africa, and was later parachuted into Occupied France, where an agent's life expectancy was only six weeks. Her courage, quick wit, and determination won her release from arrest more than once, and saved the lives of several fellow officers, including one of her many lovers, just hours before their execution by the Gestapo. More importantly, the intelligence she gathered was a significant contribution to the Allied war effort, and she was awarded the George Medal, the OBE and the Croix de Guerre.

Granville exercised a mesmeric power on those who knew her. *The Spy Who Loved* tells the extraordinary story of this charismatic, difficult, fearless, and altogether extraordinary





4. The Matchmakers Gift by Lynda Cohen Loigman

Even as a child in 1910, Sara Glikman knows her gift: she is a maker of matches and a seeker of soulmates. After making matches in secret for more than a decade, Sara must fight to take her rightful place among her peers, and to demand the recognition she deserves.

When her beloved Grandma Sara dies, Abby inherits her collection of handwritten journals recording the details of Sara's matches. But among the faded volumes, Abby finds more questions than answers. Records have begun to be posted on our website!

We have almost 30 volunteers and have completed over 6,000 of the 26,000 or so records. Here's a link to the data (for members only) posted on the society website to date: https://jgasgp.org/cemetery-data



Also, Alan Kaminsky, our coordinator who is maintaining our master list, notes: I think we have learned that we keep finding new items to question. We learned a lot about the different sections of the cemetery and had to add/clarify sections on to the standard cemetery map, that some people buried cremains there - sometimes in the grave of their spouse. There is a lot of checking and rechecking of records to ensure accuracy, that there are many rules to follow in how to input data and our instructions had to be modified several times as we discovered unique records and differences in how the data was entered on the cards. That even after entering hundreds of records each, we and our volunteers are still learning what to enter.

We think we have all the volunteers we can manage at this time, but we would take names of interested people for a waiting list in case anyone drops out. Contact Karen Albert if you'd like to be added to our list.


Locating Vital Records in Poland Using Online Resources

Zoom link will be sent the week of the event.

Description: If you are researching your Jewish ancestral roots in Poland and would like to go beyond Jewishgen and JRI-Poland to find vital records this presentation is for you. This program introduces major websites such as Metryki, GenBaza, Szukajwarchiwach (the Polish State Archives), Geneteka, and FamilySearch. Learn more about the Polish partitions to introduce history and geography of Poland. Our speaker genealogist, Julie Roberts Szczepankiewicz will illustrate the use of religious records, passenger manifests, naturalization records, and other documents from U.S. sources, to suggest resources and strategies to help you decipher misspelled place names and discuss the next steps in your research: determining the parish and civil registry office using gazetteers, and obtaining birth, marriage, and death records to determine one's ancestral village accurately. Julie will rely heavily on online sources throughout her presentation and show how you can trace your Polish ancestry without having to cross the ocean.

Julie Roberts Szczepankiewicz is a genealogist, writer and speaker, with over 20 years of experience in researching her family's origins in Poland, Germany, the U.S. and Canada. She is the Secretary of the Polish Genealogical Society of Massachusetts, contributes to a number of genealogy-related Facebook groups, and writes an informative genealogy blog, From Shepherds and Shoemakers.
