Date: Sept 15, 2025

We were very lucky to have two fabulous speakers at our meeting yesterday! **Dan Rottenberg**, a pioneer and visionary, spoke about the history of Jewish Genealogy and our society. It all started with a meeting of the minds in a NY public library. He mentioned Alex Haley and "Roots" and it's influence for the future launching of genealogy societies, amateurs, professionals, books, conventions, etc. The changes have been very exciting from their first meeting in that library. Now with the internet, DNA, and AI, who knows what discoveries are out there for us. He concluded with "The best is yet to come".

Benjamin Nathans gave a lively talk about Selective Integration: The Evolving Legal Status of Jews in Imperial Russia, 1795-1917. By the middle of the nineteenth century, more Jews lived in the Russian Empire than in any other country in the world. Eager to modernize their relatively backward agrarian kingdom, Russia's rulers enacted a series of laws designed to integrate "useful" Jews, mimicking the results of emancipation in Western Europe without creating a society of equal citizens.

He talked about the privileged Jews who could travel outside of the Pale of Settlement, social unrest, and discontent. He said most Jews did not leave because of pogroms or military conscription, but because of poverty and the poor living conditions. We learned a lot from him and hope he returns.

Benjamin is the author of the multiple award-winning books, Beyond the Pale: The Jewish Encounter With Late Imperial Russia. His latest book, To the Success of Our Hopeless Cause: The Many Lives of the Soviet Dissident Movement, tells the story of dissent in the USSR from Stalin's death to the collapse of communism.

# **Book Club Update**





She has written more than 20 books, including a memoir about growing up as a child of survivors titled First Hitler, Then Your Father, and Now You. She earned her doctorate in adult education. She is the founder and first president of Triangle JGS of North Carolina (Chapel Hill/Durham/Raleigh).

Sunday, October 26, 11 am Pacific Part 1: Working with Tabular Data in Transkribus

Description: This workshop is a must! Join us to discover how Transkribus can help you unlock documents in tabular format and take your genealogical research to the next level with AI.

*Transkribus* is the leading online platform for the automatic recognition of text and the extraction of information from historical documents. Used by thousands of researchers, archives, libraries, and genealogists worldwide, it combines powerful AI tools with a user-friendly interface designed to make the transcription, searching, and processing of historical materials accessible to everyone, with no programming knowledge required. Originally developed as part of the Horizon 2020 "READ" EU project, it is now maintained and further developed by the non-profit-oriented READ-COOP European Cooperative Society.

This workshop focuses on one of Transkribus' most advanced features: table recognition. Geneal-ogists and historical researchers often work with materials such as census records, parish registers, tax rolls, or other sources arranged in tabular format. These documents usually consist of numerous pages, making manual transcription a time-consuming process. In addition, standard text recognition workflows fail to capture the row/column relationships, which are crucial to understanding this type of data.

During the session, experts from Transkribus will guide you through the full process of training your first table model. You will learn how to draw tables in the Transkribus editor, create training data, train a model capable of automatically detecting similar tables, and evaluate its performance. Once recognized, the data can be searched for key information, such as names, dates, or places, or exported into a spreadsheet for further analysis and use in genealogical databases.

Lastly, the workshop will introduce the collaborative features available in Transkribus, such as sharing collections, working in teams, and reusing trained models across projects. It will end with a Q&A session, offering participants the opportunity to ask questions and receive advice from Transkribus experts.

The workshop is document-driven and tailored to the materials participants submit in advance, enabling you to apply each step of the workflow to your own sources.

Please note that this is an advanced-level workshop designed for users already familiar with the basics of Transkribus. To ensure the best learning experience and acquire all the essential knowledge about Transkribus, we kindly request the participants to complete some preparatory steps:

Registrants will receive preliminary materials and introductory videos.

If you are new to the platform, register at <a href="https://app.transkribus.org/">https://app.transkribus.org/</a>, upload a few pages, and test the basic text recognition feature using one of our public models (for more guidance, read the Beginners' Guide to Transkribus on our Help Center).

This workshop will be followed by a second one in January focused on training custom text recognition models.

#### **Condolences**

We were saddened to learn of the death of Gary Mokotoff z'l, a dear friend, mentor, and Jewish genealogy pioneer. Gary was a strong supporter of JewishGen since its inception.

Through his leadership in many organizations (Jewish and non-Jewish), his creativity and genius, Gary helped to establish the Jewish genealogy field. He was a founder and president of the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies, Co-Chair of the Board of Governors of JewishGen, and leader of many other organizations. He professionalized the field with the publication of the academic journal, *Avotaynu*. He was the first recipient of the IAJGS Lifetime Achievement Award.

Among his many contributions, a few stand out. Gary used two divergent yet complementary modalities to help people explore their Jewish roots.

From one perspective, he recognized the value of technology. In his professional life, he developed the IBM 1401 programming system in 1959. But it was the application of this technology to his personal passion that was impactful in two everlasting ways.

Many years ago, people would attend genealogy meetings and conferences not only for expert guidance, but to discover family members. There were books that societies maintained with the surnames and ancestral towns of genealogists who submitted this information, in the hope that someone scanning the names in the book would recognize a connection.

Gary saw how inefficient this method was, and how leveraging technology could exponentially expand the real-life impact of this tool. As a result, he created an electronic family finder which was ultimately donated to JewishGen and placed online – an invaluable resource that today has over one million names: The JewishGen Family Finder.

In addition to the Family Finder, Gary developed a tool to accommodate the many variations of translation and transliteration of names. Known as the Daitch-Mokotoff Soundex, this tool has

enabled people to identify relatives with spelling configurations they may not otherwise have searched for.

The entire Jewish genealogy community extends sincere condolences to Gary's family, friends, and colleagues.
