She also updating her power point presentation and it's attached. I took notes, but using AI, Zoom summarized the meeting.

Meeting assets for JGASGP Meeting with Deborah Long

Meeting summary highlights:

QUICK RECAP

The meeting focused on Holocaust research resources and genealogy, with Deborah Long presenting her extensive research on family members who perished during the Holocaust. She shared detailed instructions on using key resources including the Arolsen Archives, Holocaust Museum in Washington DC, Yad Vashem, and the International Red Cross for tracing family history. The presentation included practical demonstrations of searching these databases, with examples from her own family's history, and emphasized the importance of verifying information through multiple sources. The discussion highlighted how technology has transformed access to historical records, with Deborah noting that she received documents from the Red Cross within days of her 2010 request, compared to the years-long waits of previous decades.

Some of Debbie's suggestions were to contact every organization every few years. New information is always popping up. Visit memorials and look at the names.

Members: Contact Red Cross for tracing and documentation of Holocaust family members

Members: Contact local Red Cross chapter for assistance with tracing forms

Members: Submit inquiries to Arolsen Archives and US Holocaust Museum


Members: Contact Yad Vashem for research assistance

Members: Contact JewishGen for research assistance

Members: Contact local libraries to access Ancestry.com

Members: Contact University of Pennsylvania or other local universities to access USC Shoah videos
Members: Visit synagogue, city cemeteries, and Holocaust monuments/museums when traveling to search for family information
Members: Contact Central Zionist Archives if family members went to Israel after the Shoah
Members: Read Esther Safran Foer's book "I Want You to Know We're Still Here".

Beginner's Corner and Research Tips

Two fabulous resources are available on our website:



*Sydney Dixon told us about **FULL TEXT SEARCHING** on Family Search at last month's meeting. If you want to learn more about that, you can attend or watch on Zoom a presentation of the Main Line Genealogy Club. It's on January 20th. ***See below for the MLGC registration.**

I attended a virtual workshop called "What is Family Search's FULL TEXT SEARCH"

What is it? How should I use it? How can I improve it?

FULL TEXT SEARCH is the ability to search unindexed searchable transcripts. You can find some documents (Possibly) that you didn't know existed. You can gain access to handwritten documents that you missed.

Using wildcards, Keywords, and Filtering, all help to narrow searches.

Choose a research goal. Keep checking back often as more records are added.

Use Keywords appropriately. John + Doe will result in ever record with both names included. John will result in only John records. John – Doe will give Joe records without Doe listed.

Put quotes around a person's name during your initial search!

Filter by location.

Add Keywords with a + sign.

Use Wildcards

Keep filtering.

Try putting the name in the Keyword location.

Below is from Ancestry.com's support topics.

Wildcard searching

Wild cards are [special symbols used in searches](#) to represent unknown letters in a word. Ancestry® uses the asterisk (*) and the question mark (?) as wild cards. If you didn't know, for example, whether a certain last name was spelled "Nielsen" or "Nielsen," you could do a search for the name using a wild card where the unknown letter goes: "Niels?n."

The * represents zero to five characters, while the ? represents one character. Wild cards do not work with Soundex matches. When searching with wild cards, at least the first or last character must not be a wild card, and all searches containing wild cards must contain at least three non-wild card letters. For example, though searching "*ohnson" and "Johnso*" would work, "*ohnso*" would not; and while "*ill" would work, "*lI" would not.

Wild cards can be used in various ways.

Spelling variations: Because names in historical records are sometimes misspelled or abbreviated, searching for spelling variations can help you find records you may otherwise miss.

Names found on original records: Names are indexed as they appeared on original documents, even when the document contains abbreviations or apparent errors. Try searching for variations and abbreviations. Example, the name James Bruny may appear in records as *Jim, Jas., Jimmy, J, Bruny, Bruney*, and so forth.

Within the past year, the LDS's online family history web site, **FamilySearch**, has added an incredible new capability, "**Full Text Search**".

"Search what?" you might ask. How about nearly everything? Using artificial intelligence, the **FULL TEXT** of billions of handwritten records are now available for you to search. Join planning committee veteran Michael Kearney for a demonstration of Full Text Search's capabilities beginning with a few worked examples from his bag of search wonders. Then, we'll open the floor for an open-ended, audience Q&A.

Michael Kearney, PhD, has been a genealogist and family historian for more than 30 years and has been a member of the MLGC Planning committee since 2018. His work has been published in the NEHGS Register, the NYGBS Record and the Connecticut Nutmegger. His most recent work has been "The Ganges Family History Project – Constructing the

histories of 135 enslaved Africans rescued by the sloop-of-war USS Ganges in 1800", found online at thegangesfamilies.com.







Below are a few suggestions I've received:

Ancestry

Maybe you can let members know that Philadelphia Free Library system now has a free library edition of Ancestry.com. You must be in the library. I visited Bustleton Branch.

Montgomery County also has this. Access must be in the library. Some features are missing, but it is a great help to me. We can send the documents that we see to our computer by supplying an email address.

My Heritage

We can use a Philadelphia library card (or from another town) to access this site **from home**. It is free. I use Huntingdon Valley Library, Online Resources. We just type in our library card number.

FamilySearch

This is free from home.

So now we have three free sources ---MyHeritage, Family Search, and Ancestry. They each have different advantages.
